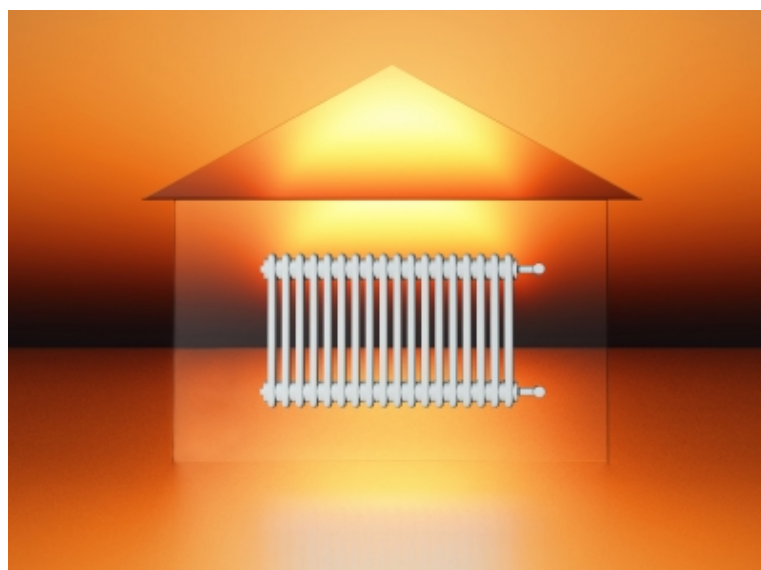

Don't Burn Through Your Budget

Mother Jones states that certain types of [electric convection heaters](#) can save you a pretty penny when it comes to your energy and heating bill. While a room-by-room method likely won't save you money if you have a big house to heat, heating up smaller spaces will almost certainly cost you less than using central heating. The smaller your room, the more cost-effective it'll be to heat. Space heaters are typically convection heaters and they're designed to work efficiently in smaller areas. While this may not be ideal if you have a lot of room to heat up, it's perfect for those of you who may only need one or two spaces heated at any given time. It's particularly ideal if you're living in a studio apartment or other location that only has one or two rooms to heat in the first place.

These units are also much smaller than radiant heaters, once again being a bonus for you if you don't have a lot of space to spare. Wall mounted [convection](#) heaters like some of the models available on ConvectAir are particularly ideal for

space-saving, as they're often very slim and fit directly onto the wall, leaving you more floor space.

Keep the Whole Room Heated

[Fan convection heaters](#), in particular, are great at providing whole room warmth, which is a big difference from radiant heaters, which generally only warm up one area of the room. This can also be good for people who suffer from breathing stale air in the winter, as it creates a continuous air flow.

The smaller your apartment or place of living, the more benefits you'll reap from having a convection heater this winter. However, even if you have a larger area to keep warm, you could find that the power these little devices pack is actually plenty to suit your needs.
